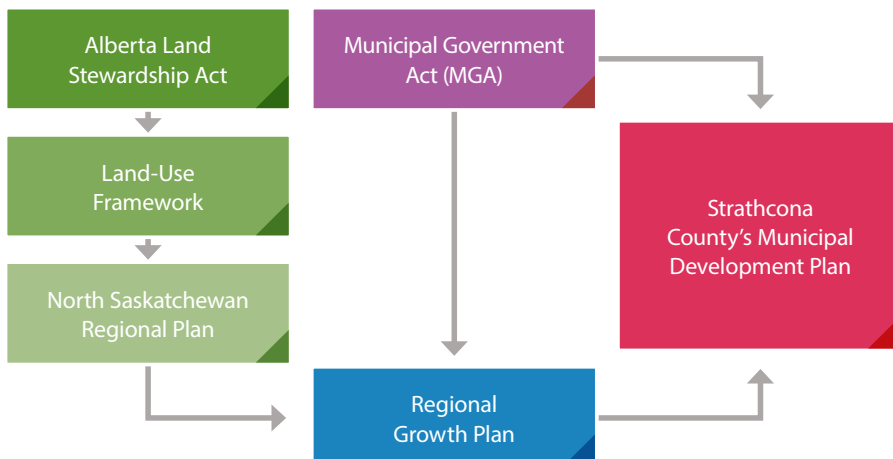

What are the next steps?

The draft plan has been finalized and will be presented to Council as information at the Priorities Committee Meeting on May 16. First reading and a public hearing for the Municipal Development Plan Bylaw are scheduled for the Council Meeting on May 23 at 7:00 p.m. At the public hearing members of the public will have an opportunity to speak to Council regarding the proposed Bylaw. Council agendas and Notices of Public Hearing can be found at www.strathcona.ca/agenda.

The Municipal Development Plan must align with the Regional Growth Plan mandated by the Capital Region Board. After the Municipal Development Plan Bylaw is given first reading by Council, the Plan will then go to the Capital Region Board for their review. Pending Capital Region Board approval it is anticipated that the Bylaw will be brought back to Council for final adoption in July or September 2017.



MDP Quick Facts:

What is the MDP?

The MDP is a comprehensive long-term land use policy framework to guide present and projected growth and development.

Why do we need an MDP?

Under the Municipal Government Act (MGA), all municipalities in Alberta are required to have an MDP.

How does the MDP guide growth?

The MDP outlines a vision and goals for the future of the County and includes objectives and policies for how the County will achieve that vision through land use decisions, development management and investment in infrastructure and programs.
