# **Birding Activity Guide for Kids**

Kids are natural explorers who enjoy learning through investigation and discovery. This guide includes suggested games and activities to engage children in the bird-watching experience.

## Did you know?

You can find birds almost anywhere; in OPEN AREAS like fields or yards, in FORESTED AREAS with lots of trees, and near WATER HABITATS like streams or lakes.

## 1. Birdie Says (Simon Says)

The goals of this game are to encourage movement, reinforce information about birds, and have fun!

### Birdie Says Commands:

- Swoop like an owl.
- Hop like a sparrow.
- Tap on a tree like a hummingbird.
- Dive for prey like a hawk.
- Soar like an eagle.
- Flap your wings like a Canada Goose.
- Strut like a peacock.
- Waddle like a duck.
- Stand like a flamingo.
- Shuffle like a penguin.
- Run fast like an ostrich.

#### 2. Lead the Way

Kids love being the leader and being outdoors is a great opportunity to let them take charge. For this activity, let them choose a park, trail, or green space to explore. Encourage children to lead the investigation by offering options and asking open-ended questions.

#### **Options/Questions:**

- Would you like to go for a walk or find a place to sit while looking and listening for birds?
- Would you like to look for birds or their nests?
- Which way would you like to go?
- If you locate a nest: What items did the bird use to make it? Was it high in a tree or low to the ground?
- Do you see any signs that a bird was here? Items such as cracked seeds, tracks, whitewash (poop), owl pellets, and feathers are all signs a bird was in the area.
- Close your eyes and listen. If you hear a bird call, point to where you think it is coming from.
- How many different types of birds can you find?

## 3. Bird Calls

There are many ways to describe or identify a bird, but one aspect of bird identification that cannot easily be described in words is the call or song a bird makes. Below are some tricks you can use to remember their sounds:

- Robin ~ Cheerio, cheery-me.
- Black-capped Chickadee ~ Cheeeeese burger, chicka-dee-dee-dee.
- Gold Finch ~ Po-ta-to-chip, po-ta-to-chip.
- Downy Woodpecker ~ Peeeeeeek.
- Barred Owl ~ Who cooks for you? Who cooks for you?
- Sparrow ~ Oh, dear, Canada, Canada, Canada.
- Nuthatch ~ yank, yank, yank.
- Blue Jay ~ queedle, queedle, queedle.

## 4. Old MacDonald Had a Park

Old MacDonald had a park;

E-I-E-I-O.

And in his park, he had a **crow**;

E-I-E-I-O.

With a **caw, caw** here; and a **caw, caw** there.

Here a **caw**, there a **caw**;

Everywhere a **caw, caw**.

Old MacDonald had a park;

#### E-I-E-I-O.

\*Repeat the verse, replacing the **bold words** above with the suggestions below:

- Owl hoot, hoot
- Robin tweet, tweet
- Magpie wock, wock
- Goose honk, honk
- Duck quack, quack

## 5. Let's Pretend

Birds are amazing nest builders! They build incredible homes with items they find in nature. Pretend you are a bird and build a nest of your own.

- First, find an open area to build your nest.
- Next, wander around gathering items such as sticks, grass, dried leaves, mud/snow, and other bits of things to use to make the nest.
- Then, carry the materials in your "beak" (two hands near your mouth) back to your chosen area for nest building.
- Once you have collected all your items, decide what shape you want your nest to be.
- Then, work together to create an outline of that shape on the ground.
- Continue adding materials to the shape to build a thick outline and fill in the middle of the nest with soft and light materials.
- Finally, it's time to play! Encourage children to use their imaginations to become birds. They may choose to be a mommy or daddy bird, sitting on eggs in their nest. Or maybe they will be baby birds chirping for a snack or learning how to fly. <u>The sky is the limit!</u>
