

Strathcona County Livestock Over-limit Permit Application - Instructions

It is important to read and understand the following before completing the form.

Responsible livestock ownership is about respecting animal and public health, neighbouring properties, the environment, and the economy. Strathcona County's [Responsible Livestock Ownership Bylaw](#) focuses on three key principles: minimize disease risk; support animal welfare; promote environmental and land stewardship.

Steps to take before submitting your Livestock Over-limit Permit application

1. **Determine allowable livestock units (LU's) for your property and livestock**

The Responsible Livestock Ownership Bylaw 53-2022 sets the number of allowable livestock on a rural property. This depends on land use zoning and property size. Land use can be determined from the [Property Assessment Tool](#).

Under the bylaw, properties zoned as one of the following, qualify for livestock units based on property size:

- a) Low Density Country Residential (RCL);
- b) Medium Density Country Residential (RCM);
- c) Small Holdings (RS); or
- d) Rural Residential/Agriculture (RA) where the parcel is less than 20 acres in size.

Residents can have up to 10 LUs per 0.5 acres on properties zoned RCL, RCM, RS or RA (less than 20 acres).

Livestock allowances do not apply to most parcels zoned to include "Agriculture, General" as a permitted use. For these properties, please follow guidelines as set out by the *Agricultural Operation Practices Act*.

Within the bylaw, all allowable livestock types have an assigned number of Livestock Units (LUs). Generally, larger livestock are assigned more units. Residents can have up to 10 LUs per 0.5 acres on properties zoned RCL, RCM, RS or RA (less than 20 acres). [List of permitted livestock and the number of assigned LUs. \(102.9 KB\)](#)

2. **Ensure you have a Premise Identification (PID) number for the location of your livestock**

As part of the provincial *Animal Health Act*, livestock owners must register with the Animal Premise Identification (PID) Program and obtain a PID number for the location of the animals. The purpose of the PID is for traceability. The PID will be used to help protect animal and public health and safety in situations of natural disasters and disease outbreaks in a specific area. 3. **Consider effects of additional livestock**

Different types of livestock have different requirements which must be considered, especially on acreages. Additional livestock will result in additional waste that will need to be managed. Grazing may be a concern and will need to be controlled to avoid overgrazing. Disease concerns can increase as the density of livestock on a property increases. Consider the impacts of the livestock you are considering, and how you will plan for and address these challenges.

4. **Apply for a Strathcona County Livestock Over-limit Permit (if needed)**

Livestock Over-limit Permits are required on rural properties where residents would like to have more livestock on-site than may be allowed by the Responsible Livestock Ownership Bylaw 53-2022. The application process requires the applicant to notify the adjacent neighbours of the application. This will provide neighbours the opportunity to discuss potential concerns with you and/or the County.


